

Rectors Report

I 6 Thus says the Lord: Stand at the crossroads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls. (Jeremiah 6:16)

18 Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. 19 I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? (Isaiah 43:18-19)

Summary

2022 was a year with three deservedly named 'crises', together with many things in the ongoing life of the parish to celebrate.

Alongside this we said a thank you to several deeply dedicated volunteers and staff, and welcomed their successors. I have cited these two Old Testament passages as the challenge is to be rooted in the deep truths of our faith (Jeremiah 6) while at the same time being open to the new things God has in store for us (Isaiah 43).

Response to crises

The 3 crises were Russia's renewed and barbaric invasion of Ukraine, the continuing impact of the Covid pandemic and lockdown, and the impact on many of the hike in energy and other prices.

We held a special service of prayer for Ukraine after the invasion in February, and this has remained uppermost in our prayers ever since. We have sought to provide practical help for refugees and their local hosts, and fundraising for relief in Ukraine, most notably a very successful concert in April.

The first half of the year continued to be dominated by the pandemic, with constraints on our services and the negative impact on the health and wellbeing of many. More happily we saw growing congregations as the year progressed, with numbers at Christmas services pretty much back to pre-pandemic levels. We are also keeping the best of the

innovations from the lockdown, such as streaming of services and holding more services and events outdoors.

The Barnes Fund Needs analysis in 2021 showed that despite much prosperity locally, there is also considerable economic and social need and deprivation, and the cost of living crisis has exposed and worsened this further. St Mary's has worked in partnership with other local churches and agencies to provide help through signposting to statutory and voluntary services, providing vouchers for use at local cafes and a Thursday warm space in the Melvill Room.

Goodbye and hello

This was a year of change in many important positions in the church. Among our volunteers, most notably Phil Bladen retired, succeeded by Steve Cox, joining Fouki Heller as churchwarden. Patrick Findlater stepped down as treasurer, replaced by Michael Ross-McCall. Sue Adams laid down the leadership of the flower arrangers, with a new team being built, supported by Judith Blacklock in her stead. St Mary's is completely dependent on the dedicated commitment of so many volunteers, not least those named above, and so my thanks goes to each and every volunteer.

A large contemporary parish cannot rely on volunteers alone. We have strengthened Kitson Hall by employing Anita Janus as the new manager, releasing Cheryl Cole to focus directly on the growing demands of church administration. We have employed Pauline Clarke to take on the bookkeeping role previously carried out by Tiziana George. We were sad to say goodbye to Henry Chandler as he resigned to develop his career as a professional violinist, but pleased to welcome Toby Ward as his successor.

Another goodbye was to Rev'd Sister Margaret Anne who had provided such caring and thoughtful ministry to the parish, particularly during the previous vacancy, following her decision to semi-retire and relocate to Sussex.

Rectors Report

It has been good to welcome two new faces to our ministry team.

The major development was the decision to appoint an Associate Priest, shared with the Parish of St Michael & All Angels, and we were delighted to recruit Revd James Marston who joined us at the start of December. The role is designed both to strengthen our existing pattern of ministry and to enhance our pastoral care, particularly looking outwards in the parish. Revd Heinz Schultheiss, a retired German Lutheran pastor has also joined the two James's, Richard Harries and Geoffrey Barnett in our ministry team, leading evensong and preaching

Other highlights

The important role of St Mary's in civic life was demonstrated by the celebrations of Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee with a special service and garden tea party in June. This was sadly followed in September by mourning her death, with the ringers swift to announce this with the tolling of bells, many signing the book of condolence and praying in the church, and a special service of thanksgiving for her life and for the new King.

Every celebration of the Eucharist is a high point, and I am grateful for all who contribute in so many ways to enabling these and our other services to take place. Alongside the special seasons of the year, 2022 saw the restructured all-age "All-Together" services, the return of Sunday Club, an ever growing of toddlers and their parents and carers on Tuesday mornings, children welcomed to their First Communion and teens being confirmed. We are fortunate to have Jackie Davis and Julie Smith leading our children and families work, and it is very good that PCC has renewed and extended their employment. As mentioned above we have also enjoyed a number of services in the church garden, especially at Easter and Christmas, and in the summer we

held a Climate Sunday outdoor Eucharist for the first time.

The many different groups representing life at St Mary's are celebrated with their own reports in this review, and as St Paul reminds us, the body of Christ, like any body, is mutually inter-dependent, and the smallest thing can often be the most important in reality. However, an exceptional part of parish life is the Friends of St Mary's, under the inspired leadership of Andrew Summers and many volunteers. 2022 saw the return of key events which had not been possible in the pandemic, and the second year of the BookFest which is surely now a staple part of the annual calendar. Friends events play a key role in drawing people to St Mary's and the fundraising for our charities, including the church itself.

As the year ended PCC agreed our new mission action plan (MAP) for the next 3 years and this provides the key focus as we commit to Growing in Faith, Serving the people of Barnes, and Caring for God's Creation. Please take a look at this on the next page of this Review.

Conclusion

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their support over the past year, both in my ministry and personally to Alice and our family. Barnes is an amazing place in which to live and work, and I count my blessings as I look forward to all that God has in store for us in 2023.

After weeks of preparation, we were blessed with lovely weather and a long queue outside the churchyard for the bike sale in September. We had received 182 bikes and all but 25 were sold on to new owners. The remainder were past repair and used for spare parts. The team recycles as much as possible.

The team raised an amazing £16,800, a £2,000 increase on 2021. The cumulative total over the last 15 years: 1770 bikes repaired and sold, and over £100,000 raised for St Mary's and our charities. An impressive result by any standards.

Huge thanks to the whole team. Many hands make light work and it is a really fun event to be involved with. We're always looking for new volunteers. Barnes Team Ministry

The three Church of England churches in Barnes are legally joined as a Team Ministry. Whilst we keep our own PCCs, finances and distinct ethos, the team structure gives us all,

clergy and laity, extra strength for our mission and ministry from receiving and giving mutual support. The membership of the Team Council includes the Team clergy, Readers and Churchwardens with two elected lay members from each church.

The three churches bring different but complementary styles of churchmanship and each church can learn from each other's gifts.

The Team Council seeks to develop the relationships between the churches, with opportunities to share in worship, and joint activities.

During the year the clergy continued to meet regularly to exchange views, plan for joint events, including services, and offer one another support where useful. The churches continued to support key projects in Barnes, including FiSH Neighbourhood Care, The Castelnau Centre and the Barnes Foodbank. Churches were supporting each other with advice, eg on recruitment of young people's workers, on financial management and on management of our halls. As members of Churches Together in Barnes we join in activities through that route.

Now that we have sold our curates house at 52 Boileau Road there is no practical need for a bank account for the Team.

Once final transfers of the residual funds are made to the churches the account will

be closed. Meanwhile the 2022 accounts are in the papers for the APCM.

Bellringers Report 2022

2022 witnessed a return to the joyful, celebratory ringing we were party to prior to the pandemic. Whilst its huge impact on the world of bellringing did not leave Barnes unscathed, with the positive and cheerful support of all our ringers, bellringing has remained a prominent, integral part of both St Mary's and the wider community.

We have rung every Sunday. Saturday practices have run successfully, with two training bells now installed we are ready to train 'Ring for the King' recruits for the coronation. Friday night Quarter Peal attempts and practices have thrived with 27 Quarter Peals recorded.

The Barnes Music Festival opened with our presentation 'The Music of the Bells' and in July, our Tower Opening, saw us not only raising £370.90 for tower funds, but, witnessing a young couple becoming engaged on the tower roof! Then followed the Barnes Summer Trip, based in Himley West Midlands.

The Queen's death on 8th September saw us ringing on fully muffled bells (with the tenor open at backstroke); Trisha rang 96 whole pulls, shortly after the announcement. The next day we rang at noon in her memory and a Quarter Peal in the evening. Open bells rang on the Sunday to mark the proclamation of the new King then again on muffled bells on the day of the funeral.

December saw us ringing handbells at Viera Gray, Walsingham Lodge, The Royal Hospital for Neurodisability, as part of the churchyard carol service and the children's nativity service on Christmas Eve.

Children, Family and Youth Work

Children and family work at St Mary's Barnes is flourishing, with new families attending and engaging in services and events, alongside those who have been longer established as part of our congregation.

The Tuesday Toddler group continues to be well attended and successful, with around 28 children attending each week, along with their carers. We are at the point where a number of children 'move on' to nursery, but numbers remain consistent because of continuing interest from those with younger children. We have had some lovely feedback from families and many 'first timers' are coming on the recommendation of those who already attend.

Sunday Club attendance remains steady with an average of 10- 12 children attending each session. Our small but dedicated team of volunteers continue to consider Christianity in an age-appropriate manner and safe environment that encourages questioning and open questioning.

The All Together Services continuing to be well attended by both families and the wider congregation, with feedback being encouraging. This now feels like at established way of worship at St Mary's and important in allowing different age to come together to share their faith in a manner that is meaningful to all. We ran an Entry to Communion course in May 22, with 7 children participating. We also organised confirmation classes for 3 teens who have all now been confirmed within the diocese. As always, we are delighted to be able to guide our children in the next step in their faith journey.

Numerous other child, youth and family activities have also taken place alongside our core work. Annual events such as the Christingle service, the Nativity promoted participation and were well attended. We have also contributed to other events such as the Christmas Fayre, the July Open Day and the Queen's Jubilee. This allowed opportunity to expand our reach to those not actively engaged in the church on a regular basis.

We continue to highlight Christian responsibilities and perspective on social, political, and environmental issues, and work to engage children and young people in taking action at an age appropriate level. This year we held a Christian Aid Walk to promote thinking about those who are in extreme poverty and have to walk a large proportion of their day just for basic

food. We also held a short family friendly service and evening compline, followed by an all age sleepout, to raise awareness of homelessness and support Glassdoor. On a sunny Saturday morning, we had four children run the coffee shop at St Mary's (and several other bake ahead) in aid of Toilet Twinning. Over £200 was raised for this amazing charity which brings sanitary facilities to poor and rural communities across the globe, improving hygiene and helping reduce disease.

Children, Family and Youth Work, cont'd

In March 23, we supported a local Ukrainian children's group to establish their 'new home' in the Ellerton room. This group brings together Ukrainian families in the area to enable them to share and promote their culture and heritage whilst in new surroundings. We will continue to work to with them to secure funding and also to create good relationships where we can work together for all of the children who access our church.

In the next 12 months, we will continue to nurture and grow what is already established. Our key aim is to establish deeper working partnerships with local schools and other key

child and youth focussed organisations.






Christmas Cards 2022

Communications Group

The Communications Group continues to promote events and the church message via the Weekly News, internal and external noticeboards, our website and social media. Our social media presence on Instagram, Twitter and Facebook is steadily growing and between the three platforms we have over 1000 followers. The Weekly news is sent via email to over 600 subscribers. We work closely with AJ, our Kitson Hall administrator, and also with Julie and Jackie who look after the Children and Youth groups. Our ongoing projects include organising a technical team to help with the streaming of events and services, updating our website, and organising the many photographs that we have on Dropbox.

Environment Group

St Mary's is seeking to play our part in protection of God's natural world, particularly from the threat of climate change. The Church of England aims to attain net carbon zero by 2030 and we must do our bit.

We are celebrating the natural world in our worship, through events such as Creation Sunday, and through holding some services outdoors. We are seeking to manage our churchyard in an environmentally conscious way, through the plants we grow. In 2022 we installed bird boxes (made from recycled wood) and a new bench for relaxation and contemplation. We will plant a new tree.

We use a lot of power to heat and light the church and the Kitson Hall.

When there are practical alternatives to gas heating we want to consider that. Meanwhile we have better temperature controls in the church and hall, and we are looking at better insulation in the hall. New flood lighting is cutting electricity use. And until we reduce our carbon use the PCC has agreed that we should offset it by payments to green projects overseas.

On the environment page of the church website we encourage good practice, individually and jointly – recycling, litter picks, walks in our many parks. And there is a box in church for recycling crisp packets. We can support action world wide - such as joining the toilet twinning scheme which was spearheaded by the Sunday Club.

So far St Mary's has achieved a bronze level Eco-Church award for our results, and we are now working on the silver award.

We thank the members of our planning group for their work. Do join us, and bring your enthusiasms to strengthen our efforts. How about becoming St Mary's environment champion, to encourage us to greater efforts?

Fabric Committee

The Fabric Committee supports the PCC in maintaining our Grade II* listed building in good condition and improve our facilities.

In 2022, the lych gates were restored with funding from a generous donor. The new memorial to the Hoare family has now been installed in the Langton Chapel. Call points to set off the fire alarm, operated wirelessly, have been installed at the church entrances, to meet current regulations.

We await diocesan approval of proposals to upgrade our audio system in church, to give much better quality sound, and to install a projector and drop down screen so that pictures can readily be shown at church and external hire events. As with so many things at present we will need to wait some time for equipment to be supplied.

We seek to reduce our use of fuel in the church. Refurbished floodlights, recently installed, will help a little. We might be able to double glaze the top windows in the lantern over the altar. But we await better technology before it will be sensible to replace the gas boilers we use.

A big new project is extra toilets, to have enough for a full church for our many services and events over the year. The PCC will consider how to provide for these within our rather constrained land footprint and at a reasonable cost. We will consult the congregation on a proposal later in the year.

We are as ever grateful to the members of the Fabric Committee who give their expertise to make these things happen.

Friends of St Mary's Barnes

The Friends of St Mary's Barnes raise funds for the church and other charities with the aim of enhancing our community role. This year has been extra busy post-Covid with a programme of successful high profile events.

The Barnes Charity Ball returned in May 2022, delayed from its normal time in February, with the theme Havana Nights, and then again in February 2023 with the theme A Night at the Oscars.

In April we hosted a celebrity event For Ukraine raising funds for Ukraine humanitarian charities. In the summer, we hosted the Barnes Common Artshow with the theme Living with Water.

In June we hosted the launch of Chris Patten's Hong Kong Diaries and in September we held the second Barnes BookFest with 19 events to hear authors such as Jonathan Porritt, Bonnie Garmus and Robert Harris.

The Barnes Charity Fashion Show was back in October with two sell-out performances. Our Annual Choral Evensong in October featured Canon Andrew Zihni from Southwark Cathedral.

The Barnes Music Festival 2023 Festival returned in March with the theme The Musical Environment and a full programme of 37 events over two weeks involving 600 performers.

All these events not only bring many new people into the church but generate considerable funds for the church and nominated charities which amounted to a record figure of $\pounds72,000$ in 2022. These funds are used to pay for all the church's maintenance and utility costs as well as projects such as church wall renovation, lighting improvements and fire alarm installation.

The Good Companions (2022)

The Good Companions came into existence in the year 2000. It is a socially active group for men with a membership which is mainly of retirement age. On a voluntary basis, one or two members organise and run a Lunch once a month. This can be in the member's own home or if that is not possible, then in the Ellerton or Melvill Rooms, at St Mary's Church, using the Church kitchen and facilities. Occasionally we have our monthly lunch at the Red Lion Pub or other Public Houses in Barnes. We had our Christmas Lunch in The Spencer in Putney. Wives are always invited to the Christmas Lunch and any other activities outside the monthly lunches.

We encourage members, who have expertise in any activity, to organise and run outings. In the past we have walked over 700 miles on paths such as the Thames Path, The Ridgeway, and North Downs Way from Canterbury Cathedral to Winchester Cathedral. We have had boat trips on the Thames, visited The Mansion House, The Law Courts, The Cavalry Museum, Whitehall, The Kings Cross Development and several special exhibitions at Highgrove House, Petworth and other National Trust properties. We encourage members to organise trips out and we always include wives in any outings. We actively support one charity – Combat Stress. We hold a Coffee Morning on the Remembrance Weekend in November each year and hope to raise substantial amounts of money for this very worthy cause.

Kitson Hall


New Hall Manager

We successfully recruited a new hall manager, Anita Janus (AJ) last April, in place of Cheryl Cole, to allow Cheryl to devote much needed time on church matters.

Hirings and community use

With most pandemic restrictions removed by the end of 2021, we had a good spread of regular users during 2022. These included a group offering cycle tuition for toddlers and children, various exercise, yoga, dance, ballet, theatre and fitness classes for children and adults, and a new pilates class.

The nursery which had hired the small hall for very many years went into liquidation last July. Terms were agreed for Alice Wells, T/A Barnes Petite Performers (BPP), who runs various parent and toddler groups and children's parties, to take over the small hall from

last September. BPP have become the biggest income generator for Kitson Hall, earning it considerably more than the nursery ever did.

The BCA Jumble Sale took place over the October half term in 2022, which interfered less with our regular hirers than in previous years. As usual, Barnes Community Players hired the hall for 10 days for their pre Christmas show.

Hallmaster

Soon after AJ joined, she introduced a new online booking system called Hallmaster. This allows members of the public to request bookings via the church website. This has speeded up and simplified bookings considerably, removing reliance on a paper diary and allowing much simpler monitoring of bookings and payments.

Hall income and expenditure

Gross income was £74,200 (exceeding the previous record by about £5,000) compared with £45,494 in 2021, and the net surplus was £33,463, £30,000 of which was transferred to the Youth Fund. This compared with a net surplus of £11,056 in 2021. Surpluses shortly before the pandemic were between £25,000 and £30,000.

Maintenance repairs and improvements

There were no substantial alterations or repairs in 2022 though the kitchen was decluttered and a small amount of money was spent in providing new crockery.

Marriage Preparation at St Mary's

The Marriage Preparation Team helps couples having a wedding in Barnes prepare for their future marriage. Once a couple has met with the clergy, the administrator puts them in touch with one of the five trained team couples. The engaged couple then fills out an online questionnaire via Prepare Enrich and then has two or three evening sessions with a team couple, where they talk confidentially about issues relating to married life. The team meets twice a year over supper to discuss how to enhance the service offered to those marrying at St Mary's and to share best practice.

Music Report

It is pleasing to review what has been a vibrant and rewarding first year (almost!) at St Mary's, with a number of memorable highpoints within an overall period of growth.

Regular Sunday Eucharist contributions aside, the Senior Choir has enhanced a number of special services to an impressively high standard (Friends of St Mary's, Queen Elizabeth II, Nine Lessons and Carols, the BMF Evensong, to mention a few). We have welcomed new members, welcomed back former choral scholars, and in doing so laid down strong foundations on which to continue to build.

I am grateful to the core members of the Senior Choir, in particular Judy Gowing and Peter Boyling for their commitment and support. New members are always welcome, particularly tenors and basses!

We have expanded our choral scholar programme this year in partnership with West London Free School. I hope to expand the current crop of five scholars to eight in September. Aside from enjoying their musical contributions, I believe supporting and training the next generation of church musicians is an essential part of our mission as a parish. It would be wonderful to hear from any members of the congregation who might consider sponsoring a choral scholar, or donating to the Music Fund to support this expansion.

We have not managed to secure an organ scholar this year, but in September we welcome Barnaby Silverstone, second year student at the Royal College of Music, who will provide vital support and allow for a greater breadth of musical options.

The Junior Choir (Choristers) has been steady and regular, with membership fluctuating between 6-12 members. The aim into the next academic year is on recruitment, and to solidify their contribution to St Mary's; singing more Sunday morning services, and hopefully bringing more families into our church community. If you know a child (aged 7-14) who loves singing, please encourage their parents to be in touch!

Almost a year since my appointment, this opportunity is as good as any to thank you all for such a warm welcome. Working for such a supportive and kind community is greatly rewarding! I must stress how much the choir and I welcome congregational feedback. It's a great pleasure to pass on complimentary feedback (a great boost and galvanising for the choir!). Constructive comments are equally welcome. If you feel the music has beautified our worship (or not...!) – please tell us!

Safeguarding Report

We are committed to safeguarding the young and vulnerable in our church and community. The Safeguarding policy can be found in the Church entrance and on the Church website along with photos of the PSOs. We have continued to ensure that adults working with children and vulnerable adults have an upto-date DBS and have completed a Confidentiality Declaration (in line with the Diocese recruitment process).

During the year we have continued to adhere to diocesan recommendations by:

Ensuring and advising re Risk Assessments for all activities within the church buildings are undertaken, updated, and safely stored within the church office.

Ensuring all PCC members, Sidesmen and Sunday Club leaders have up to-date Safeguarding Training. Due to the pandemic, some training had been delayed but this is now up and running again and many of the required courses are not only available face to face but can now also be completed online.

Ensuring all people working with vulnerable adults or children have completed a Confidential Declaration document

Ensured that all newly recruited posts (specifically our new Director of Music and our Assistant Priest) were recruited following Diocese Safer Recruitment procedures.

Continuing to raise the profile of Safeguarding within the Congregation. The PSOs contact details are on the pew sheet every week as well as a section identifying St. Mary's commitment to Safeguarding.

The Safeguarding aspects of the Church website are frequently updated in line with national guidance.

Safeguarding remains a mandatory item at every PCC meeting. This is both to allow members to raise any concerns and to ensure that any PCC matters discussed are also viewed with Safeguarding in mind.

Sunday Club and Pastoral care guidelines are written with Safeguarding kept as a priority and ensuring that all leaders and helpers are aware of them.

To improve the safety and well-being of our congregation and church community several volunteers, members of PCC and sidesman undertook a First aid awareness course which was very informative and much appreciated.

This coming year we will continue to maintain the actions as listed above. We will continue to work with the Diocesan Safeguarding team to ensure that St Mary's keeps its whole community, especially our young and any vulnerable adults, welcomed, safe and appropriately cared for at all times.
