Rector's Report Summary

I will start my report with a summary of the key parts of church life in 2023:

The parish's civic role was paramount in celebrating the coronation of King Charles III with a special service of thanksgiving and tea party for the local community. We celebrated the 60th anniversary of FiSH and its excellent work locally. More sadly we marked the first anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine with a special evening service. Similarly we encouraged people needing a 'warm space' during the cost of living crisis to use the church during the week and in hosting a weekly tea & chat.

The core of the church's life in proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ has been encouraged by the large number of baptisms, weddings, and confirmations. We had an enjoyable START course on Christian basics. We have seen a gradual recovery in congregational numbers generally, getting back near to pre-pandemic, and a consistent number worshipping online through regular streaming. The wider involvement of local people in St Mary's continued to flourish through the events organised by the Friends of St Mary's and the use of Kitson Hall.

Being outward looking from the parish is also central to our mission. We have continued to do this through the payments made to the Parish Support Fund helping churches across south London in the Diocese of Southwark. Through fundraising of the Church and Friends, more than £32,000 was donated to local and other charities, the majority of which are longer term relationships, also with volunteering and prayer support.

The church building and grounds continue to be well used by individuals and local organisations. The church facilities have been enhanced by the installation of a new audiovisual system. The historic link with the Hoare family was celebrated through the dedication of a new memorial in the Langton Chapel.

I was fortunate to have a sabbatical from the parish in the summer, and used this to recharge my batteries mentally and spiritually and enjoy more time with Alice and other family and friends. I am grateful to the churchwardens for leading the parish while I was away, our administrator Cheryl Cole for, as ever, doing so much to keep the show on the road, and to Rev'd James Marston our Associate Priest for providing additional priestly ministry. We share James 50:50 with St Michael's, but the parish had the greater part of his time during the sabbatical.

It has been a pleasure to see James Marston developing his ministry with us during 2023, and successfully adjusting to the different styles and needs of the two parishes! James put up with, and occasionally also flourished in living on a houseboat by Kew Bridge, but its delights were starting to wane, and I am glad he was able to move back on land to a flat in January 2024.

Each year there are comings and goings in those who lead ministry and key aspects of church life. Early in the year the diocese confirmed that Rev'd Heinz Schultheiss, who is a retired German Lutheran pastor, could be licensed to preach and lead any service other than communion, and I am grateful for the gifts and experience he brings. At the APCM we thanked Steve Cox for his service as churchwarden, in particular for the new ideas and energy he brought to the role, and welcomed back Paul Teverson as churchwarden alongside Fouki Heller. We also thanked Judy Gowing for many years service as PCC Secretary, and Helen Gibbs for stepping into her shoes.

In late summer we were sad to lose Julie Smith, our youth worker, due to her move to Australia with her husband's work. We have not lost her entirely as she keeps in touch online and recorded a video message to play at our new year's service! Meanwhile Jackie Davis has done a terrific job supporting our children and families, with the continued strength of the Tuesday baby & toddler service, weekly Sunday club, and monthly all age All-Together Eucharist.

Rector's Report

Music continues to be at the heart of our worship and an important way in which many are involved in the life of the church. Toby Ward moved on as Director of Music in the autumn, and in the interim while we recruited, Julia Daniels did a great job working with the choir in preparing for the Christmas season. It is great news that Ben Markovic became our new Director of Music in January 2024.

In the autumn, Geoffrey Barnett made the transition to become a Lay Reader *Emeritus*, like Christabel Gairdner the year before. Similarly, Fiona Barnett became a Southwark Pastoral Auxiliary *Emeritus*. It was very good to have the opportunity to thank Fiona and Geoffrey for all that they have given to St Mary's, and all they continue to give.

Of course there are always challenges in parish life - we are commissioned by Christ to 'make disciples of all nations' and to share the good news of God's love for all - and so can never rest on our laurels. We live in an area of peace and prosperity for some, but not for others. The habit of churchgoing has been lost by many during the pandemic, and gradually over many years before. The church is not seen in a positive way by many people.

Conclusion

However overall, St Mary's is a very special place in which to have the privilege of leading the ministry and mission as incumbent.

This comes with huge thanks to so many of you, for the support, love and friendship given to Alice and me in 2023.

Churchwardens Report

We are delighted to report that 2023 saw a gradual return to pre-pandemic levels of in person attendance at services and for church-based activities. The streaming of services has enabled a regular number to attend remotely.

In May we celebrated the Coronation of King Charles with church services and a tea party that was attended by 250 people from the community. Our Rector James went on a 3 months sabbatical and returned refreshed both physically and spiritually in August. We are grateful to Rev'd James Marston and Bishop Richard Harries for presiding and preaching at services throughout that period and for all their support during the Rector's sabbatical. We are delighted that James M is now anchored on dry land, and living amongst us in Barnes, after an extended flotation on the houseboat. We are grateful for all that he has contributed to life at St Mary's and for the outreach role he plays in the community. We welcome Heinz Schultheiss to the clergy team. We wish to give our especial thanks to our Rector James for his unassuming leadership, his spiritual guidance, his dedicated ministry and for all his new initiatives reaching out into the community. A number of small changes, judiciously made, can be as effective as wider reforms. We welcome the arrival of our new Director of Music Ben Markovic, and wish to thank Julia Daniels for preparing our choir for the Carol Service as well for her continuing work with the junior choir.

With the departure of Julie Smith our youth worker, Jackie Davis has been kept very busy successfully leading the children's services, the growing baby and toddler service on Tuesday mornings, and making St Mary's a church that welcomes and caters for children and their families.

But none of the events and successes of this year would have happened without the support of so many dedicated volunteers. The Annual Review shows the wealth of activities reported on by the many different groups. We wish to express our gratitude to each and every volunteer and for all they do to keep St Mary's at the heart of the community, making it a warm and welcoming place for all to enjoy. We would especially like to thank our parish safeguarding officer, Lis Munden and her outgoing colleague, Natasha Mold, in helping to keep St Mary's a safe environment for all.

Once again, we are indebted to Peter Boyling for chairing the Fabric Committee and whose report we gratefully adopt. The office of a churchwarden is a venerable one going back to the time of Archbishop Langton. It carries with it legal responsibilities and duties that will be off-putting to some. We can only say that it has been a privilege for us to serve in this role and we sincerely hope that in the years ahead many others not already in leadership roles will come forward so that St Mary's has the benefit of new energies and ideas. We wish to thank you all for the support you have given to both of us in our role as wardens throughout the year.

Barnes Charity Bicycle Sale 2023

After weeks of preparation, we were blessed with lovely weather and a long queue outside the churchyard for the bike sale in September. This year, we received 195 bikes and all but 10 were sold on to new owners. The remainder were past repair and used for spare parts. The team recycles as much as possible.

The sale raised an amazing £18,500 (including Gift Aid) - a 10% increase on 2022. This is one of the most lucrative fund-raising events for St Mary's and brings a new group of people into St Mary's every year. In the light of the challenging budget, the team decided to keep the lion's share of the proceeds with St Mary's, but our charities (Castelnau Centre, AgeUK Richmond, FiSH, UTS and Glass Door) all received over £1,000 from the sale.

The cumulative total raised since we started (more years ago than anyone can remember) is £140,000 for St Mary's and our partner charities. The sale is run by the 'Inner Tube': Trisha Hawkins James Kyrle-Pope, Sanchi Murison, Richard Nickels, Matthew Purser and me.

Huge thanks to all the volunteers: mechanics who grease, tighten brakes, replace tyres, and clean the bikes and admin angels who register the bikes, making sure there is accountability to the donor and sell the bikes.

We're always looking for new volunteers. If you would like to join a friendly team working on a fun event, we would love to hear from you.

Barnes Team Ministry


The three Church of England churches in Barnes are legally joined as a Team Ministry. While we keep our own PCCs, finances and distinct ethos, the team structure gives us all, clergy and laity, extra strength for our mission and ministry from receiving and giving mutual support. The membership of the Team Council includes the Team clergy, Readers and Churchwardens with two elected lay members from each church.

The three churches bring different but complementary styles of churchmanship and each church can learn from each other's gifts. The Team Council seeks to develop the relationships between the churches, with opportunities to share in worship, and joint activities.

During the year the clergy continued to meet regularly to exchange views, plan for joint events, including services, and offer one another support where useful. The churches continued to support key projects in Barnes, including FiSH Neighbourhood Care, The Castelnau Centre and the Barnes Foodbank. Churches were supporting each other with advice, eg on recruitment of young people's workers, on financial management and on management of our halls. As members of Churches Together in Barnes we join in activities through that route.

Michael Murison and Geoffrey Barnett have been loyal St Mary's members of the Team Council, and have stood down during the year. We thank them for their valued service.

Bellringers Report 2023

2023 was a vibrant and busy year at Barnes with the first few months very much dominated by teaching 'Ring for the King' recruits in readiness for the Coronation. We also found ourselves becoming media stars when, fuelled by the interest in the RFTK initiative, TV crews from both London and abroad filmed our training sessions. Coronation day saw us ringing first thing in the morning then returning in the afternoon for a wonderful tea party attended by around 50 people. 35 people in total rang for the King that afternoon!

Our tower opening as part of the Barnes Fair on 8th July raised £197.70 for the church. July saw the annual Barnes summer tour taking us to Hartington in the Derbyshire Dales. Despite rather a lot of rain, it was a most successful trip and we look forward to returning to Derbyshire in Summer 2024.

December saw us once again ringing handbells in our local community; Viera Grey and Walsingham Lodge care homes, the Royal Hospital for Neuro-disability, and the carols in the churchyard. Our ringing as part of the Barnes Christmas Festival saw us raising over £130 for the homeless charity, Glass Door, in just one hour!

Our Saturday learners' practices have continued to flourish, as have our Friday evening Quarter Peal attempts and more advanced practices. Sunday service ringing has been very well attended throughout the year. We also had a good attendance on both Christmas Eve and Christmas Day this year.

Children, Family and Youth Work

Children and family work at St Mary's Barnes continues to thrive, with many families attending and engaging in services and events, a number of whom are core members of our congregation who attend regularly.

Our work continues with the aim of highlighting Christian responsibilities and thoughts on social, political, and environmental issues. We work to engage children and young people in taking action, and in understanding service and stewardship at an age-appropriate level.

In September 2023, Julie Smith, our youth worker left her post due to relocation. This was a loss to St Mary's, however Julie worked with the team to ensure that there was a good handover and so as minimal impact as possible on the work we do.

The Tuesday Toddler remains popular and is well attended. There continues to be a steady flow of new families attending as children move on to nursery and so numbers are consistent. The feedback has been positive, asserting that both children and carers enjoy the group and appreciate that it is welcoming to all.

Sunday Club attendance is steady with an average of ten to twelve children attending each session and thirty-eight children registered. Given that St Mary's does not have a linked school that would provide a flow of children, the numbers in this organically grown group are very positive. A range of methods, such as discussion, questioning, storytelling, and games are utilized alongside crafting, reflection, and prayer in order to provide access to faith that is fun, varied and meets the differing needs of all who attend.

The committed team of volunteers continue to support the children in their exploration of Christianity in an age-appropriate manner and in safe environment. All-Together Services are attended by both families and the wider congregation, with feedback continuing to be encouraging. This is now an established way of worship at St Mary's and important in allowing different generations to come together to share their faith in a manner that is meaningful to all. The addition of the children's choir singing at these services, along with the adult choir is a great step forward in acknowledging that all ages should be able to participate in these services.

After a year off, we will again be running an Entry to Communion course in April 24, with a Service during our Pentecost Service on 19th May. We are delighted to be able to guide and support our children in the next step in their faith journey. Numerous other child and family activities have also taken place alongside our core work.

Annual events such as the Christingle service, the Nativity were well attended and provided opportunity for those who do not attend church regularly to be involved alongside those who do. We have also been involved in events such as the Christmas Fair, the July Open Day, and the King's Coronation. Our second 'Lent Litter Pick' took place on Saturday 23rd March with twelve eager participants stepping up to do their part to contributing to the local community.

Our established relationship with the Scouts is ongoing and they will be attending our St George's Service on 21st April to renew their promises. As in previous years, they will also be invited to various evening sessions to help them earn their faith badge, whilst also strengthening their links with the church.

In the next 12 months, we will continue to nurture and grow, with a particular focus in forming stronger working relationships with local schools.

Churchyard Garden





It is wonderful to see our Barnes neighbours using our churchyard for relaxing in the sun. They, like us, greatly appreciate the results of the hard work of our gardening team, our lawn mowers and our path sweepers who tend it so carefully week by week through the year.

Communications Group

The Communications Group continues to promote events and the church message via the weekly pew sheet, internal and external noticeboards, our website and social media. Our social media presence on Instagram, Twitter and Facebook is growing, particularly Instagram where we now have over 800 followers. We publicise the upcoming Saturday morning coffee shops and associated charities in the pew sheet and on social media, and have recently put together a poster showing the charities we have supported and total amount raised.

We continue to work closely with AJ, our Kitson Hall administrator, and also with Jackie, our Children and Families' worker. In our January 2024 meeting, we were joined by the diocesan lead on digital giving and the digital giving officer who provided us with very helpful feedback and advice about updating and simplifying our donations system. As a result, our ongoing projects are now focussed on this, along with reconfiguring the Payaz machine, looking at how we best promote and collect Gift Aid, and redesigning the donations page on our website. Separately, we are continuing to promote our Sponsor a Chair appeal and reassessing our presence on social media and whether we would benefit from using other growing platforms such as TikTok.



Environment Group

We have a responsibility to seek to protect God's natural world, particularly from the threat of climate change. The Church of England aims to attain net carbon zero by 2030.

We continue to celebrate the natural world in our worship, through events such as Creation Sunday, and through holding some services outdoors.

In managing our churchyard our gardeners make a careful choice of the plants we grow. They added a bug hotel this year to the existing bird boxes, and we have replaced the old compost bins with new ones to be used environmentally. A large bough of the old yew tree came down in a storm; we will ensure that the wood is properly reused.



We await better technology to enable

us to replace the gas boilers we use in the church and the Kitson Hall. Meanwhile we are concentrating on ways to use the heat in the hall wisely, and we are drawing up plans to improve its insulation. And until we reduce our carbon use the PCC is offsetting it by payments to approved green projects overseas.

On the environment page of the church website we encourage good practice, individually and jointly, including recycling and walking and cycling wherever we can. Another litter pick walk with the children in our congregation is about to take place.

So far St Mary's has achieved a bronze level Eco-Church award for our results, and we are now working on the silver award.

We thank the members of our planning group for their work. Do join us, and bring your enthusiasms to strengthen our efforts. We do need an environment champion, to encourage us to greater efforts. Is this you please?

Fabric Committee

The Fabric Committee supports the PCC in maintaining our grade II* listed building in good condition and improve our facilities.

We are pleased that the diocese approved our proposal for a better audio system and a drop down screen to show pictures at church and external hire events. After a very long wait for the parts to arrive, they were installed before Christmas and are proving very successful.

Before the 40th anniversary celebrations of the rehallowing of the church we were able to install a new wall plaque to commemorate the life of Canon Juergen Simonson, who as our Rector did so much to revitalise the church after the 1978 fire.

We are still working on proposals to add to the number of toilets in the church. Initial proposals were far too expensive; current proposals are creating practical issues that we are seeking to resolve.


We continually seek to reduce our use of fuel at St Mary's, but double glazing the top windows in the lantern over the altar proved much more expensive than we could justify funding. We are focussing our efforts at the moment on the Kitson Hall, where we expect to get more cost effective results.

We are carrying out periodic checks of our new fire alarm system, in between the professional checks every six months. Apologies to those hirers of the Melvill Room who were subject to alarm bells due to my inexperience in doing the checks!

We are as ever grateful to the members of the Fabric Committee who give their time and expertise to make these things (and many others) happen.

Faith in Action Group

One of St Mary's priorities is Outreach. In response to the many blessings we receive we should be generous in serving the needs of people locally, nationally and internationally. So we promote the work of a small number of charities in each category. Their work should challenge the way we see the world and our part in it.

Month by month we give information about each organisation, and we encourage prayer, financial support and practical help for them. One or other of our charities is always among the special prayers for the week. You can find information about our charities at the back of the church. It is good that some of our congregation volunteer for local charities: do join us if you have some spare time!

We donate to our charities proceeds from our Friends of St Mary's events, the Charity Bike Sale, Christmas Fair and the sale of Christmas cards. In 2023 we donated to:

Some St Mary's events donate funds to other causes, contributing to a total from St Mary's in the year of £32,570. Of that we have donated £2876 to the Princess Basma Centre in Jerusalem, a project that JulieAnn Sewell is close to, recognising the special concerns we have for Israel and Palestine at present.

In addition Christian Aid raises funds in Barnes each May. And on top of all that our Saturday coffee shops raise funds weekly for a wide range of charities. In 2023 these coffee shops donated a total of £11,096.

Friends of St Mary's Barnes

The Friends of St Mary's Barnes raise funds for the church and other charities with the aim of enhancing our community role. This year has again been busy with a programme of successful high profile events.

In April 2023 we hosted the launch of **Richard Harries autobiography** The Shaping of a Soul – a life taken by surprise with Richard in conversation with Rabbi Baroness Julia Neuberger. In September we hosted the third **Barnes BookFest** with a wide range of speakers including Matt Frei, Lawrence Dallaglio, Robert Peston, Sir Tom Courtenay, Anne Glenconnor and Sir Anthony Seldon. This was followed in October with **Lord Michael Heseltine** speaking about the transformation of his country estate *Thenford*.

In July, we hosted the **Barnes Common Artshow** with the theme *Living with Trees*. The **Barnes Charity Fashion Show** returned in October with two sell-out performances. Our **Annual Choral Evensong** in October featured Rt Rev Dr Martin Gainsborough, Bishop of Kingston.

In December we held another **Christmas Cracker** celebrity event. The **Barnes Charity Ball** returned in February with the theme *Midnight in Paris*.

In February we were pleased to contribute to the **40th Anniversary** celebrations with a display of photographs from Richmond Council and the installation of a plaque in memory of Rev'd Canon Juergen Simonson.

The **Barnes Music Festival 2024** returned in March with the theme *Legends* and a full programme of 35 events over two weeks involving 750 performers including the Kanneh-Mason Trio, Dame Imogen Cooper and Pavel Kolesnikov.

All these events not only bring many new people into the church but generate considerable funds for the church and nominated charities which amounted to £48,000 in 2023. These funds are used to pay for all the church's maintenance and utility costs as well as projects such as the new audiovisual installation.

The Good Companions (2023)

The Good Companions came into existence in the year 2000. It is a socially active group for men

with a membership which is mainly of retirement age. On a voluntary basis one or two members organise and run a Lunch once a month. This can be in the member's own home or if that is not possible, then in the Melvill Room, at St Mary's Church, using the Church kitchen and facilities. Occasionally we have our monthly lunch at the Red Lion Pub, Barnes or at the White Swan Twickenham. We had our Christmas Lunch in the Cote Restaurant, Barnes. Wives are always invited to the Christmas Lunch and any other activities outside the monthly lunches.

We encourage members, who have expertise in any activity, to organise and run outings. In the past we have walked over 700 miles on paths such as the Thames Path, and The Ridgeway, We have had boat trips on the Thames, visited The Mansion House, The Law Courts, and The Cavalry Museum, Whitehall. We encourage members to organise trips out and we always include wives in any outings. We actively support one charity – Combat Stress.

In February this year we were awarded 'Community Group of the Year 2023'.



Next came All-Day refreshments in Church for Barnes Fair Day which raised over £1,000 for good causes and lots of positive comments from happy customers (especially for our salad lunches). We organised a Bring and Share Harvest lunch in Kitson Hall in the early autumn and at the end of the year mulled wine and mince pies for our churchyard Carol Service. We continue to offer the ever-popular post-service Sunday coffee and our weekly Saturday morning Coffee Shop (see separate report) and occasional events such as the Easter Dawn Breakfast.

A big thank you to my fellow hospitality committee members and to Wiz and the Sunday coffee team. The St Mary's congregation and the Friends of St Mary's always come up trumps and we are never short of support, generosity, skill and time. Having said that we are growing a bit older so would very much welcome some 'younger' members on the committee please!!

Kitson Hall

Hall Manager

Our hall manager, AJ (Anita Janus), whom we recruited in April 2022, has been running the hall very efficiently.

Hirings and community use:

It has been an excellent year for the community at Kitson Hall. At the weekends the space was transformed into a party venue for various occasions, whilst during the week it served as an activity space for all ages. Classes included a group offering cycle tuition for toddlers and children, various exercise, yoga, dance, ballet, theatre and fitness classes for children and adults.

Alice Wells, T/A Barnes Petite Performers (BPP), who runs various parent and toddler groups and children's parties, hired the small hall throughout 2023 under license but has decided not to renew when it comes up for renewal in September. It is currently being marketed locally.

The BCA Jumble Sale took place over the October half term in 2023. Barnes Community Players (BCP) hired the hall for their Summer show but did not hold a pre Christmas show in 2023.

Hallmaster and new remote lock system

Our online booking system, Hallmaster, introduced in 2022, has been working well.

In 2023 we introduced a new remote lock system using keycodes. Hirers are issued number codes instead of keys. This gives us far greater control as the codes, in the case of short term hirers for parties etc, are only valid for actual duration of hire, and reduces the considerable expense of replacing lost keys.

Hall income and expenditure

Gross income was £100,986, a record by a considerable margin (Gross income in 2022 was £74,200, itself a record), and the net surplus was £45,548, also a record by a considerable margin. AJ is congratulated for all her efforts in achieving such an excellent result.

Maintenance repairs and improvements

The stage was totally decluttered of all the BCP paraphernalia just before Christmas, making it much more attractive for hiring for staged productions.

Safeguarding Report

We are committed to safeguarding the young and vulnerable in our church and community. The Safeguarding policy can be found in the Church entrance and on the Church website along with photos of the PSOs. We have continued to ensure that adults working with children and vulnerable adults have an upto-date DBS and have completed a Confidentiality Declaration (in line with the Diocese recruitment process).

During the year we have continued to adhere to diocesan recommendations by:

Ensuring and advising re Risk Assessments for all activities within the church buildings are undertaken, updated, and safely stored within the church office.

Ensuring all PCC members, Sidesmen and Sunday Club leaders have up to-date Safeguarding Training. Due to the pandemic, some training had been delayed but this is now up and running again and many of the required courses are not only available face to face but can now also be completed online.

Ensuring all people working with vulnerable adults or children have completed a Confidential Declaration document.

Ensured that all newly recruited posts (specifically our new Director of Music and our Associate Priest) were recruited following Diocese Safer Recruitment procedures.

Continuing to raise the profile of Safeguarding within the Congregation. The PSOs contact details are on the pew sheet every week as well as a section identifying St. Mary's commitment to Safeguarding.

The Safeguarding aspects of the Church website are frequently updated in line with national guidance.

Safeguarding remains a mandatory item at every PCC meeting. This is both to allow members to raise any concerns and to ensure that any PCC matters discussed are also viewed with Safeguarding in mind.

Sunday Club and Pastoral care guidelines are written with Safeguarding kept as a priority and ensuring that all leaders and helpers are aware of them.

To improve the safety and well-being of our congregation and church community several volunteers, members of PCC and sidesman undertook a First aid awareness course which was very informative and much appreciated.

This coming year we will continue to maintain the actions as listed above. We will continue to work with the Diocesan Safeguarding team to ensure that St Mary's keeps its whole community, especially our young and any vulnerable adults, welcomed, safe and appropriately cared for at all times.
