Rector's Report

It is slightly odd writing these words in retirement, so I apologise for things I may have forgotten, and should have included. I am

pleased the process to identify a new incumbent was done about as quickly as is possible within the Church of England, and that the outcome was the appointment of Rev'd Calum Zuckert as Barnes Team Rector and Vicar of St Mary's.

Before my departure there were other significant comings and goings in the parish. In January it was a great pleasure to thank Fiona and Geoffrey Barnett for their respective ministries as a Southwark Pastoral Auxiliary, and Lay Reader. While both have retired from active ministry in these roles, they have remained a very active, wise and faithful presence. In January, we welcomed Ben Markovic as the new Director of Music. Music lies at the heart of worship and congregational life, and it is very good to have Ben's new impetus and skills to lead this.

Thanks are also due to Julia Daniels who had looked after the choir before and during Christmas and then set up a children's choir in the first half of the year. Engaging the attention of young people in church life is a continuing challenge with so many other calls on their time. However, under the leadership of Jackie Davis, St Mary's offers a range of ways in which children can grow in faith and be involved - baptisms and confirmation, the weekly toddler group and service, Sunday club, serving at the Eucharist to mention just some.

Mentioning confirmation, of course this is open to adults as much as young people, and I enjoyed preparing Abby and Mark Dimock for confirmation at St Richard's, Ham early in the year, having previously married them and baptised their son Henry and Abby! As a church we should always be seeking to grow deeper in faith, as well as seeking to reach as many people as possible in different ways. James Marston and I enjoyed leading a series of "Quiz a Vicar" evenings in the Red Lion, and James also led a number of Thursday morning discussions on key issues of faith. It was special for me to lead for a final time, the great highlights of the annual cycle of worship including Epiphany, Candlemas, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost.

It was good to welcome those joining church life and faith, and generally numbers returned to pre-pandemic levels. I am grateful for all involved in the parish's worship, both up front and behind the scenes. Particular thanks go to James Marston for his support and ministry before the vacancy, and then during it. Having an Associate Priest is a great asset, and James has brought his own skills and experience in pastoral care, teaching and leading worship, including negotiating the breadth of this across St Mary's and St Michael & All Angels! A highlight of ministry in Barnes has been the privilege of being alongside Bishop Richard Harries. Frequently it seemed that he told us all that is essential in the Christian faith, in just one short sermon!

One of the many parts of Barnes life I miss is the regular diet of activities organised by Andrew Summers and the Friends of St Mary's. In my last few months, I enjoyed the extraordinary quality and breadth of the Barnes Music Festival, the fun of the Barnes Charity Ball, and of course the benefit for the church and charities of all the funds raised. A different fundraising challenge which was completed this year was the re-upholstery of the church seat upholstery.

St Mary's seeks to be at the heart of community life in Barnes, and so our relationships with local groups and charities, the Barnes Community Association, other local churches and faith groups, and others continued to be very active. In June, the church also hosted the hustings for candidates in the General Election. Kitson Hall also provides a valuable community resource through all of its activities. It was a great reassurance that, at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting in April, Peter Boyling stepped forward to be churchwarden, ably supported as assistant churchwardens, by Fouki Heller and Paul Teverson. Between them they have had so much experience and insight to lead the parish through vacancy. Cheryl Cole has continued to be a lynchpin as church Administrator, supporting not only the clergy and PCC, but also being the first point of contact for many when reaching out to the church. And a huge thank you to everyone who has volunteered their time over the year to the many different parts of church life. This is always essential, and an important part of Christian discipleship, but also particularly needed during the recent vacancy.

I should finish by thanking everyone for giving Alice and me such a warm and memorable send-off in July. We will never forget the generosity and friendship of so many people. With all my thanks for your support to Alice and me, and with love and prayers for the future.

Churchwarden's Report

An overview of the year

In the early summer our Rector, Rev'd James Hutchings, retired from ministry, after five years leading our mission in Barnes and at St Mary's. We gave him a very warm but sad goodbye and wish him and his wife Alice all the best in their new home.

To begin the process of seeking a successor we consulted the congregation on the priorities we wanted to focus on for the future; and we produced a parish profile for the advertisement we issued in October. With the diocese, we were able in December 2024 to appoint Revd Calum Zuckert as our new Rector, and we welcomed him in a joyful service at the start of March 2025.

During the vacancy we were most blessed in having Revd James Marston, our associate priest, to lead much of our worship and guide us. We are most grateful to him. And we also thank very warmly Bishop Harries, Revd Heinz Schultheiss, and our team clergy, Revd David Cooke of Holy Trinity church and Fr Stephen Stavrou and Revd Judith Roberts of St Michael's church for taking services for us, as well as our diocesan bishop, Christopher Chessun and Revd Elisabeth Morse. Together they ensured that we continued to fulfil our responsibility to maintain St Mary's as a place of worship for our parish.

Being outward looking is also central to our mission. We have continued to do this through payments made to the diocesan Parish Support Fund to help churches across the Diocese of Southwark. And in calendar 2024, we were able to donate £39,700 to local and other charities from the proceeds of the wonderful events run by the Friends of St Mary's, as well as our Bike sale, Christmas Fair and all the Saturday morning coffee shops.

As churchwarden during the year, I am most grateful to Fouki Heller and Paul Teverson for supporting me as assistant wardens. And many others in the congregation volunteered their help to ensure that we continued to make progress as a church community during the vacancy, with our PCC and our staff Pauline Clarke, Cheryl Cole, Jackie Davis, Anita Janus and Ben Markovic. They deserve our sincere thanks.


Barnes Team Ministry

The three Church of England churches in Barnes are legally joined as a Team Ministry. While we keep our own PCCs, finances and distinct ethos, the team structure gives us all, clergy and laity, extra strength for our mission and ministry from receiving and giving mutual support. The membership of the Team Council includes the Team clergy, Readers and Churchwardens with two elected lay members from each church.

The three churches bring different but complementary styles of churchmanship and each church can learn from each other's gifts. The Team Council seeks to develop the relationships between the churches, with opportunities to share in worship, and joint activities.

During the year the clergy continued to meet regularly to exchange views, plan for joint events, including services, and offer one another support where useful. The year was dominated by the retirement of our Team Rector James Hutchings, and the outworking of the diocesan procedure for seeking his successor. The Council approved a substantial document profiling the team and its churches and we advertised the post in October. The team vicars of St Michael's and Holy Trinity and lay representatives of our three churches, with our Bishop, Archdeacon and a representative of our historic Patron, St Paul's Cathedral, served on the Patronage Board in December. We interviewed three candidates and selected Revd Calum Zuckert as our new Team Rector. He was instituted at a packed and joyful Team service at St Mary's on 3rd March 2025.

Bellringers Report

We continue to be a busy tower offering ringing opportunities for ringers from a wide range of ringing levels, as well as serving our local community, ringing at regular services and special events throughout the year. It was lovely, for example, to ring a special Quarter Peal on 3rd March this year to mark the Institution and Induction of the Reverend Calum Zuckert as Rector of the Barnes Team Ministry.

On Sunday 12th May 2024 we celebrated 'Bell Sunday', an initiative by the CCCBR (Central Council of Church Bellringers) to raise awareness of bellringing in church communities. The bells ringing in the tower were displayed on the big screen in the church as the congregation arrived. Bell themed hymns also featured in the service and the Rector mentioned the relevance of bells in his sermon. Then on Saturday 18th May many of us headed to Kent for a delightful outing to four towers superbly organised by James, one of our ringers who recently moved there. The day was so successful that we look forward to a return visit this May.

There was a familiar pattern to July with the annual tower clean prior to the tower tours as part of the Barnes Fair on 13th July. We managed to raise £443 towards church funds. Then just a few days later, on 15th July we headed back to Hartington in Derbyshire, the base for our summer trip, where we had been in 2023. Unlike the previous year, the sun shone, and a great time was had by all.

Christmas events began in November with us running the 'church mice' game in the ringing chamber. Then December saw Christmas handbell ringing. We were able to raise an amazing £183.85 in just one hour for Crisis at Christmas ringing outside The Sun Inn as part of the Barnes Christmas Festival. We paid our usual visits to the Viera Gray and Walsingham Lodge care homes and took part in the carols in the churchyard.

Our Saturday practices have continued to flourish again throughout the year attracting ringers from many local towers including Richmond, Roehampton, Westhill, All Hallows and Chiswick; I know that they are all grateful for the learning platform that we are able to offer them. Friday evening Quarter Peal attempts and practices have continued to thrive and Sunday service ringing has continued to be well attended throughout the year.

So, another busy year here at Barnes!

Children, Family and Youth Work

Children and Family work at St Mary's Barnes continues to grow. Sunday Club is well attended and children and families continue to remain engaged in the provision we offer.

Our core aims of highlighting Christian responsibilities and thoughts on social, political, and environmental issues are unchanged. Our work seeks to engage children and young people in building a greater depth of their understanding of Christianity and what it means to be a Christian; considering key principles of service and stewardship at an age-appropriate level.

The Tuesday Baby and Toddler Group is a popular offering and is well attended. The flow of attendees is steady, with numbers remaining consistent with newcomers joining as older children move on to nursery. We receive positive feedback about the group, often with regard to the welcoming and relaxed nature of the group, along with the biblical aspects which set it apart from other groups.

Sunday Club attendance is steady with an average of ten to twelve children attending each session. This is an above average attendance for a children's Sunday group, and is particularly positive when you consider that there is no linked school providing a natural throughput. We continue to teach using a range of methods, such as discussion, questioning, storytelling, and games are utilized alongside crafting, reflection, and prayer. This provides access to faith that is fun, varied and meets the differing needs of all who attend. Our small but committed team are an integral part of being able to successfully deliver this.

All-Together Services are now a regular part of our worship at St Mary's Barnes. They remain popular in offering the opportunity for all ages of our community to share our faith.

The Entry to Communion course in April 2024 was a great success, with several children completing it and taking their first communion in the All Together Pentecost Service.

Numerous other child and family activities have also taken place alongside our core work.

The annual Christingle service was particularly notable, with attendance almost doubling from the previous year. Our Christmas Eve nativity was also busy and engaged some children and families who are not regular worshippers.

We have also been involved in events such as the Christmas Fayre, the July Open Day, and Christian Aid Week. A third Lent Litter pick will take place in early April.

We continue to have a good relationship with the local Scout group and their attendance at the St George's Day and Remembrance Service is very much welcomed. There will continue to be annual dates where the scouts can visit the church for a session in order to gain their Faith Badge.

Looking forward, we will continue to try and establish working relationships with local schools. There is also determination to develop our youth work and new opportunities for those moving into Year 7.

Environment Group

We have a responsibility to seek to protect God's natural world, particularly from the threat of climate change. The Church of England aims to attain net carbon zero by 2030.

We continue to celebrate the natural world in our worship, through events such as Creation Sunday, and through holding some services outdoors.

In managing our churchyard our gardeners make a careful choice of the plants we grow. They added a bug hotel this year to the existing bird boxes, and we have replaced the old compost bins with new ones to be used environmentally. A large bough of the old yew tree came down in a storm; we will ensure that the wood is properly reused.



We await better technology to enable

us to replace the gas boilers we use in the church and the Kitson Hall. Meanwhile we are concentrating on ways to use the heat in the hall wisely, and we are drawing up plans to improve its insulation. And until we reduce our carbon use the PCC is offsetting it by payments to approved green projects overseas.

On the environment page of the church website we encourage good practice, individually and jointly, including recycling and walking and cycling wherever we can. Another litter pick walk with the children in our congregation is about to take place.

So far St Mary's has achieved a bronze level Eco-Church award for our results, and we are now working on the silver award.

We thank the members of our planning group for their work. Do join us, and bring your enthusiasms to strengthen our efforts. We do need an environment champion, to encourage us to greater efforts. Is this you please?

Fabric Committee

The Fabric Committee supports the PCC in maintaining our grade II* listed building in good condition and improve our facilities.


We continue to work on finding a solution to the problem of how to add two new toilets to the church, to meet the needs of audiences at the very busy events we host. We live in hope of finding a practical way of supplying the need without extortionate cost.

We want to prevent the sound of the bells annoying the outside world when we are practising. We have a detailed proposal, but it is taking time to get diocesan approval. We hope we are nearly there. The bellringing fund already holds the money it will cost.

Our big yew tree outside the porch lost a bough last year and we were advised to remove another bough and reduce the weight of the other branches, to protect the tree and the church. Most of that work has been done and we seek a contractor able to finish the job. Yew wood can be very desirable for woodworkers; and we want to get the wood that has been removed from the tree into good hands for reuse. We will shortly be offering a number of small items that you might like to buy.

We are as ever grateful to the members of the Fabric Committee who give their time and expertise to make these things (and many others) happen.

Friends of St Mary's Barnes

The Friends of St Mary's Barnes raise funds for the church and other charities with the aim of enhancing our community role. This year has again been busy with a programme of successful high profile events.

The 40th Anniversary of the rebuilding of St Mary's was marked by two talks. The first in April by **Mark Beedle** of the original Cullinan design team on the rebuilding of the church. The second in June by **Scott McCracken** on the archaeological investigations after the fire.

The **Barnes BookFest** was held in September with 20 events over a weekend. Authors included Frank Gardner, Robert Harris, Miriam Margolyes and David Gower. We also hosted in November **Bishop Richard Harries** in discussion with Ven Sheila Watson discussing his latest book Wounded I Sing.

The **Barnes Charity Fashion Show** returned in October 2024 with two packed-out performances. At our **Annual Choral Evensong** our preacher was the Very Rev'd Mark Oakley, Dean of Southwark.

The **Barnes Music Festival 202**5 in March 2025 was the most successful ever with 6500 people attending 35 events over two weeks, with 900 performers including Sir Antonio Pappano, the Academy of St Martin in the Fields, Opera Holland Park, Jeneba Kanneh-Mason and Alistair McGowan.

All these events not only bring many new people into the church but generate considerable funds for the church and nominated charities which amounted to £50,000 in 2024. These funds used to pay for all the church's maintenance and utility costs as well as projects such as the new audio-visual installation.

The Good Companions

The Good Companions came into existence in the year 2000. It is a socially active group for men with a membership which is mainly of retirement age. On a voluntary basis one or two members organise and run a Lunch once a month. This can be in the member's own home or if that is not possible, then in the Melvill Room, at St Mary's Church, using the Church kitchen and facilities. Usually, twice a year, we have an additional monthly lunch at the White Swan, Twickenham. For several years now we have had our Christmas Lunch in the Cote Restaurant, Barnes. Wives are always invited to the Christmas Lunch and any other activities outside the monthly lunches. We encourage members, who have expertise in any activity, to organise and run outings. In the past, we have walked paths such as the Thames Path, and The Ridgeway. We have had boat trips on the Thames, visited The Mansion House, The Law Courts, The Cavalry Museum, and the Garrick Club. This year we had lectures and guided walking visits to the Brentford Dock area of London. We encourage members to organise trips out and we always include wives in any outings. We actively support two charities - Combat Stress, from which we were voted Community Group of the Year 2023, and the River Thames Boat Project enabling people who often have difficulty leaving their home, to have a day out on the River Thames.



Safeguarding Report

St Mary's is committed to its responsibility to safeguard the young and vulnerable in our church and community. We have continued to ensure that adults working with children and vulnerable adults have an up-to-date DBS, have completed a Confidentiality Declaration (in line with the Diocese recruitment process) and an appropriate level of Safeguarding Training.

During the year we have continued to adhere to diocesan recommendations by: Ensuring and advising re Risk Assessments for all activities within the church buildings are undertaken, updated, and safely stored within the church office. Ensuring all PCC members, Sidesmen and Sunday Club leaders have up to-date Safeguarding Training.

We have ensured that all newly recruited posts were recruited following Diocese Safer Recruitment procedures. We continue to raise the profile of Safeguarding within the Congregation. The PSOs contact details are on the pew sheet every week as well as a section identifying St. Mary's commitment to Safeguarding. The Safeguarding policy can be found in the Church entrance and on the Church website along with photos of the PSOs.

The Safeguarding aspects of the Church website are frequently updated in line with national guidance. Safeguarding remains a mandatory item at every PCC meeting. This is both to allow members to raise any concerns and to ensure that any PCC matters discussed are also viewed with Safeguarding in mind. Sunday Club and Pastoral care guidelines are written with Safeguarding kept as a priority and ensuring that all leaders and helpers are aware of them.

We have recently completed the Diocesan Safeguarding audit, which has given us confidence that we are working to keep everybody safe but also give us some areas of development which we will be able to provide updates on in next year's report.

We would like to thank the many volunteers who engage with us to complete and renew the required certifications. This coming year we will continue to maintain the actions as listed above. We will continue to work with the Diocesan Safeguarding team to ensure that St Mary's keeps its whole community, especially our young and any vulnerable adults, welcomed, safe and appropriately cared for at all times.
