PCC Report 2015-2016

The PCC wishes to take this opportunity to express our grateful thanks to Richard our Rector and Ann our Team Curate for their leadership of St Mary's over the last year, quietly and effectively aided by Paul Teverson and Patty Darke, our Churchwardens.

St Mary's activities this year have been influenced heavily by the celebration of the 800th anniversary of the re-hallowing of the enlarged church in 1215. Reports will appear elsewhere detailing the activities: the Magna Carta Festival, the production of Jesus Christ Superstar, the June Pilgrimage and the anniversary service with Archbishop Rowan Williams. The memorial window which will commemorate the visit of Archbishop Stephen Langton in 1215, will hopefully be installed during 2016. Further lasting memorials of the 800th anniversary are the new vestments and altar frontal made by the organisation Fine Cell Work.

During 2015, the Diocese introduced the Parish Support Fund which replaces the Fairer Shares Scheme as the means by which parishes fund the diocesan clergy and administration. Parishes are now encouraged to pledge an amount on the principle of generosity rather than have a prescribed amount imposed upon them. The PCC responded in the spirit of the new system. Recognizing a shortfall in our income, the PCC encouraged members of St Mary's to review their giving to the church and where possible to undertake regular financial commitments. We were very pleased with the response of the congregation which helps our finances substantially.

Sarah Chapman has been working on a new logo and identity for St Mary's which has recently been introduced. The logo is inspired by one of the Langton Chapel

windows which coincidentally forms an 'M'. Sarah has also been working on a new more user-friendly website with Sarah Arthur, which will hopefully be launched in the Spring.

We were delighted to welcome Charlie Auton, who started as our Youth & Children's Worker in October. It is a joint appointment with St Margaret's Putney. Already he has made quite an impact with the Sunday Clubs, BYG and Cafe Church.

Following an initiative discussed at the PCC Away Day, the clergy introduced weekly Prayer Workshops in Advent describing different prayer techniques, called *Waiting on God*. These were well attended and greatly appreciated as periods of reflection and calm in the run-up to Christmas.

During 2015, the Advisory Council of the Friends of St Mary's undertook to cover the costs not only of the

maintenance and upkeep of the church and churchyard, but also the utility bills. Unfortunately, the church has suffered actual and attempted break-ins over the last three years. Whether successful or not, they caused damage; and security measures have been increased.

The PCC met 7 times during the year. One of these meetings each year is an Away Day, giving us the opportunity to do some more intensive and reflective work. We use the St Mary's Mission Action Plan to guide to consider the many different aspects of the life of our church. We have decided that in 2016, we will review this Plan.

St Mary's 800th Anniversary Runnymede to Barnes Pilgrimage


19 people took part in the 28 mile pilgrimage along the Thames Path re-tracing

the journey of Stephen Langton 800 years ago. We began in Runnymede on 13th June and ended at St Mary's Barnes for a welcome of tea and cake on 15th June.

Most took part for just a day or two, others for all three days. Four carried overnight gear and spent the two nights by the riverside, downstream from Walton and hard by Kingston Bridge.

The walking group normally numbered 11 or 12 and, as we walked, new connections were made between different members of the St Mary's community. The day began and ended with a pilgrim prayer and we were privileged to stand in the Langton Chapel at the opening of the 800th anniversary service to hear Rowan Williams speak of pilgrimage and give us his blessing.





800th Anniversary Service

The celebrations came to a high point with a special service at which the preacher was Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, following in the footsteps of his predecessor Stephen Langton's visit to St Mary's 800 years ago after the sealing of Magna Carta.

The service was attended by previous Rectors of St Mary's Barnes, representatives from St Paul's and Southwark Cathedrals,

local dignitaries, heads of local schools and community organisations and a congregation of 350. St Mary's Choirs were in fine voice for the service performing two freedom-inspired works: the special *Magna Carta Anthem* by Malcolm Archer and John Rutter's *Distant Land: Song of Freedom*. Carl Jackson, Organist of Hampton Court Palace, accompanied the choirs.

Magna Carta Festival

What a wonderful celebration both of St Mary's 800 year Anniversary and of the sealing of the Magna Carta and we took the opportunity to mark these events remembering the journeys of both church and nation from that moment to the present day. Through the Magna Carta 800 Committee (chaired by Sir Robert Worcester) we were included in the national lists of events and were kept informed of the plans of cathedrals and towns that had connections to the event. St Mary's was blessed to receive some funding from a Government grant which together with funds from the Barnes Workhouse Fund and the BCA allowed us to create our own spectacular festival.

One of the lasting memories for me was of the Thames Wherry boat which was lent to us from the Wherry Trust. It was rowed down the Thames all the way from its boatyard in Richmond to Small Profit Dock in Barnes where parishioners waiting on the fore shore could see a little dot getting bigger and bigger as the boat emerged into our sight. We then took it out of the water and walked it up the High Street to St Mary's (how kind of all involved) where it was placed for the

week of the Festival decorated beautifully with flowers. It was one of our most

important exhibits as Archbishop Stephen Langton would have travelled in a Wherry boat to Barnes 800 years ago – probably stopping off for the night at the Archepiscopal Palace in Mortlake. We made several floral tapestries ourselves which were very much community efforts and involved a great number of people – local school children contributed with planted pots of herbs and Ross Allen did an amazing tapestry of flowers in the churchyard by the front door to the church. Possibly the most striking display of all were the amazing painted Baronial Shields

suspended from the rafters. These were created and painted by Isabel Courtenay, Gus Coulton and Georgiana Dacombe – works of great artistic merit in every sense. An evening opening by Lord Melvyn Bragg with a hog roast launched the week very well. This was followed by two fascinating evening lectures by Professor Nigel Saul of Royal Holloway University and Graham Seel, Head of History at St Paul's School. There was also a

children's talk by the great raconteur Christopher Lloyd whose story book on Magna Carta has been distributed to every primary school in the country. Andrew Summers with the Friends of St Mary's Barnes produced a timeline for St Mary's to illustrate our history.

Another important aspect of the Festival was the display of the new full set of vestments produced by Fine Cell Work, the prisoners' charity. We commissioned them to produce this to mark our anniversary and we were so pleased to be able to

learn about and support the work of this highly impressive charity. They gave talks involving ex-prisoners to explain how the charity works and the impact on the lives of those who get involved. Many thanks to Rosie Findlater and Sally Copland for overseeing this wonderful aspect of the anniversary year.

There was really so much to look at for all tastes and ages and I hope it will be an event that is looked back on with great interest and not a little pride – it was a big event to take on

Jesus Christ Superstar Production

Some three years ago, Rev. Richard Sewell asked me whether the Barnes Community Players could perform a play, in St Mary's Church, to celebrate the 800th anniversary of the Church's consecration. But which show would both be suitable for performance in a church: memorable, respectful and affordable? Various ideas were discussed and dismissed, until we hit on Jesus Christ Superstar. At first the Barnes Community Players were hesitant: this isn't an easy show and perhaps it was too ambitious, but at long last, we decided to go for it, and secured the rights. We found a local director, Emma King-Farlow and musical director, Phil Mitchell, settled the dates, and commenced the auditions

in January for a June show. We knew we needed help from the wider community to find the right voices, certainly for the main parts and sure enough, we found them.

After six months of punishing rehearsals, voice (and other) acrobatics and a lot of good fun, we were ready for six sold-out performances in a transformed church, thanks to the amazing efforts of our outstanding production team. The apotheosis came on the Friday night, when Sir

Tim Rice, the author of the lyrics and a Barnes resident, came to see the show, followed by an interview – and he liked it, as did the rest of the audiences and performers.

It was an exhilarating experience, and, I am sure, will remain a high point in the Barnes Community Players' history, as well as a treasured memory for all those involved, and, hopefully, the community as a whole.

I now know we succeeded in what we set out to do: provide a fitting show for an extraordinary event. To top it all, we managed to make a profit, donated to St Mary's and Imperial College Healthcare Charity.

Let me finish by thanking the St Mary's support team for their invaluable help, which, I am sure, often was a real chore, with rehearsals cutting across regular events and their church taken over, sometimes for lengthy periods. I am convinced that, when all is said and done, the result was worth the effort.

"O Lord we thank you for the part we play in your church and pray that the sound of these bells may proclaim your glory and summon the faithful to worship" This prayer or its equivalent, has been said in the Tower each Sunday by the small band of ringers who attend religiously so that service may be given, and was said with the exception of two Sundays throughout the past year because no ringing was possible.


We have rung for 4 Choral Evensongs, 6 weddings and 2 funerals. 4 peals have been rung at St Mary's (2 by visiting bands) and 20 quarter peals. Another 6 quarter peals have been rung by the band at other towers, and 46 practice sessions have been provided on Saturday mornings with approximately the same number of practices being held on Friday evenings.

Hand bells have been rung with adult and junior members of the congregation for

pre-Christmas visits to Viera Gray House and Walsingham Lodge as well as for the Barnes Music Festival evening to raise money for Under Tree Schools.

To further recruitment the Tower manned a stall at the BCA Volunteers Day which attracted quite a bit of interest and some potential new recruits.

Training has become increasingly

Using the new ART teaching methods they ran fairly intensive courses of training over the summer. One of the new recruits is now ringing regularly for Barnes and another for All Saints Fulham. The Tower continues to be a very active centre for bell ringing in the area.

There have been many highs and lows through the year but one of the highs that deserves a note is that of Barbara Ghezzi, who was taught here in Barnes, who rang her first peal at St Mary's in December after only 16 months training!

And the low has been the departure of our secretary Kristen who provided the beautifully illustrated record of events that illuminates our bell ringers' section of the Parish website. Kristen had to move to Southwark and now rings at St Vedast in Foster Lane. Coffee Shop



Deepening Faith

One of the five key areas in our Mission Action Plan is *Learning*. In this we commit ourselves to be a learning church in which people have the opportunity to deepen their understanding of faith and what it means to be a Christian. There are currently several ways in which we do this:

A Rough Guide to Christianity – is a discussion group for adults that is an introduction to Christian belief and practice led by Richard and/or Ann. Adults who have not been confirmed and would like to receive Communion join this group. The course has five sessions looking at the key elements faith relating to God, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the problem of evil and Christian ethics. We were delighted that four adults were confirmed this year by Bishop Michael Ipgrave in a service at Southwark Cathedral.

Bible Study Group — a small group continues to meet weekly on Thursdays at 10.30am in the Barnetts' house during term time. This term they have looked at some of the Psalms, and also at some of the healing miracles with the aid of Jeffrey John's good book — The Meaning in the Miracles. Anyone interested to join this group would be very welcome. During Advent and Lent we have followed something appropriate and welcomed others to join us then too.

Home Groups: Exploring the Way – one Home Group is now meeting for a second year and through the summer of 2015 were looking at St Paul's Letters to the Corinthians. In the autumn, Lucy Hine and Christabel Gairdner convened a new 'Exploring the Way' group, studying Acts of the Apostles, while Fouki Heller and Judica Palmarozza continued with the original group, leading them in a study of St John's Gospel. We meet once a week over six weeks, three times a year, always welcoming new members and enjoying both the companionship and the learning the evenings offer. You can find out details of meeting times and venues in the weekly pewsheets.

Lent Talks – these take place every year on a different theme and in the various churches of Barnes. This year the theme was *The Bible in My Life*. Five of the clergy of Barnes shared personal stories illustrating how the Bible has shaped their lives which were fascinating and enlightening. The talks also give members of different churches the opportunity to share with one another and deepen relationships between us.

Welcome into Communion Group – Rev'd Ann Lynes has written about this in her Curate's Report.

Fabric Committee

On behalf of the PCC the Fabric Committee continues to work to maintain our grade II* listed building in good condition, and where we can, improve our facilities.

The results of some of our efforts are visible. We have had trees overlooking the churchyard pruned; the path from church to Kitson Hall has been widened and the new concrete base is much cleaner and more comfortable to walk on. We have had the flooring in the vestry rooms replaced, as heavily used areas were getting frayed and dangerous. We are completing the process of reupholstering nave chairs that need it. Some results will, we hope, be visible in the future. After careful planning

throughout the year and consultation with the congregation we have sought diocesan approval to install a window to commemorate the 800th anniversary of the reconsecration of the church in 2015. We have now obtained detailed proposals for improvement of the lighting in the nave and the chapel, to increase the overall amount of light, increase the warmth of the effect of the lighting and make the system more flexible for the different uses we make of the building. The current system is thirty years old,

equipment is failing and a new system would be more economical in use of power. We will consult the congregation on the proposals shortly.

One item should hardly be visible. Following several break-ins, and a recent attempted break-in we have reluctantly come to the conclusion that we need to install CCTV on the outside of the building to protect the office and Melvill Room doors and the north side of the church. We are seeking diocesan approval for unobtrusive cameras. Some of our work will not be visible. We have sought diocesan approval to installing a humidifier for the organ to help preserve the instrument in good condition. And the regular checks on the boilers, the fire safety equipment, the lightning conductor and so on continue to be carried out.

We have had a professional audit undertaken of the accessibility of the church to those with impaired mobility etc. We are now considering what changes we should make in response to its recommendations.

I am as ever grateful to the members of the fabric committee who give their time and expertise to make these things happen: the Rector and churchwardens, Phil Bladen, David Coppinger, Patrick Findlater, Trisha Hawkins, William Heller, Michael Murison, and Sam Wright.

Faith In Action

One of the five priorities for St Mary's, in our Today and Tomorrow strategy, is Outreach. We want to encourage the church family to serve the needs of people locally, nationally and internationally through supporting charitable organisations.

We support a small number of charities in each category. We give information about what each charity does, and we encourage prayer, financial support and practical help for them.

We hope that it is helpful to see the information we offer about the charities in our pewsheet and on the church website. One or other of our charities is always among the special prayers for the week and intercessors often include the current charity in our prayers.

We thank those who have responded with practical help, including by cooking for those who attend homeless lunches; volunteering in local charities; offers of food to the Foodbank; and fundraising through participation in fun runs and other events.

St Mary's is able to help our charities by donations. The money comes from the Barnes Charity Ball, from half the proceeds of the Christmas Charity Fair, from the surplus made at the Fashion Show and from other events (not from the PCC's budget for running costs). And we give some gifts in kind, such as food donated at Harvest Festival, and toys at the Toy Service.

Over 2015 our charities were:

Castelnau Centre Project (community development in North Barnes): we gave £1045 plus £2500 from the Fashion Show, plus toys

Age UK Richmond's Barnes Green Centre (support for older people): £1045 plus £2500 from the Fashion Show

FiSH (voluntary community care in our area): £1045

GlassDoor (accommodation, advice and support for the homeless): £3000 from the Ball

Richmond Welcare (support for families and children): £1820

Southwark diocesan link supporting the clergy in the diocese of Matabeleland in Zimbabwe: £1045

Christian Aid (international development): St Mary's played a major role in the street collection in Barnes which raised £17,400; also £180 at Christmas

Under Tree Schools (education of girls in South Sudan): £9000 from the Ball plus £550

Christian Solidarity Worldwide (concern for oppressed religious minorities).

The congregation also supported the Bishop's Lent Appeal with £1492; there was a collection in October for refugees that raised £2250; the Carol Service raised £1365 for the Church Urban Fund; we staffed meals for the homeless; and those who run our Saturday coffee shops raise further funds for a wide range of charities.

Many thanks to the members of the Faith in Action group who have led its work in the year: Phil Bladen, Sue Boyd, Celia Cleave, David Delaforce, Anthony Figgis, Jo MacDermott and Veronica Schroter. We welcome new members!

Friends of St Mary's Barnes

The Friends of St Mary's Barnes raise funds for the upkeep and renovation of

our historic church building and churchyard and promote awareness of its place in the history and life of Barnes. In 2015/16 the Friends have been closely involved with the Magna Carta 800th Anniversary celebrations as well as running three major annual events: *Barnes Charity Ball* in February, *Barnes Music Festival* in March and *Barnes Charity Fashion Show* in October. These have now become established annual events which have raised considerable sums for St Mary's and for local, international and church charities and have established a strong presence for St Mary's within the Barnes community.

The *Barnes Charity Fashion Show* in October 2015 was extended for the first time to two nights to meet the high demand for tickets and this proved most successful with both nights sold out. The total audience was over 500 and the shows, which featured a different programme of Barnes Boutiques for each night, were judged as better than ever. The total raised was over £10,000 for the Friends and local charities.

The *Barnes Charity Ball* in February 2016 with the theme *The Great Gatsby* was a black-tie night of glamour and glitz celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Barnes Charity Ball. With everyone dressed for the occasion, the guests enjoyed a champagne reception in Kitson Hall before moving through to St Mary's for dinner and dancing to the Swing Zazou Electro Swing Band and both silent and open auctions. The event raised nearly £50,000 for church, local and international charities.


The Barnes Music Festival in March 2016 had as its theme Handel & Composers of

Barnes celebrating the rich variety of composers who have lived and worked in Barnes from Handel to Holst, Howells to Dodgson, Jim Parker and Carl Davis to Howard Goodall and Roxanna Panufnik. To coincide with the Festival, the new book Composers of Barnes – The Flow of Inspiration written by Eleanor Oldroyd was published and an innovative photographic exhibition Visions of Handel's Messiah was staged at St Mary's. The 25 events over two weeks at 8 locations across Barnes included many outstanding performances from individuals such as Craig Ogden, James Bowman, Alistair McGowan, Lars Tharp, Martin Neary, Christabel Gairdner, James Turnbull and Henry Chandler and from choirs and orchestras such as St Paul's School, English Chamber Choir, Barnes Choir, Music Makers and the English Chamber Singers with St Michael's Choir, not to forget the Come & Sing Choir and the Barnes Music Festival Chorus. One of the aims of the Festival is to engender

a spirit of community through music performance and appreciation and this was



certainly achieved with a total audience of over 3000 and over 750 musicians taking part. The Magna Carta Lecture in May 2015 was a very successful event as part of the St Mary's Barnes Magna Carta Festival with Professor Nigel Saul giving a powerful and informative lecture on Magna Carta - why it matters today in conjunction with the Barnes & Mortlake History Society. We published the timeline booklet Over 1000 Years of Barnes History which was widely distributed at other events in Barnes including the Medieval Barnes Fair. A history display 900 Years of St Mary's Barnes 1115-2015 was also mounted in the church for the Festival and other events.

Friends of St Mary's Barnes (cont'd)

We provided input to the new information board at Barnes Old Cemetery which was launched with an early morning open-air service in May 2015 and also organised the Election Hustings in St Mary's in April 2015 attended by 400 people. In September 2015, we hosted a lecture by Ted Cullinan as part of the 50th Anniversary of his architectural practice in which he talked about and drew his design vision for St Mary's, drawing 200 guests from across the architectural community in London and Barnes residents.

This year was the 20th Anniversary of the founding of The Friends of St Mary's Barnes and to mark the occasion, Canon Richard Ames-Lewis, who was instrumental in the formation of the Friends in 1995 as Rector of St Mary's Barnes at that time, returned to give the sermon at the Friends Annual Choral Evensong in October. A display of programmes, posters, reports and photos from the twenty years of the Friends was mounted and a 1995-2015 timeline printed.

All these events have not only encouraged greater awareness of St Mary's and brought many people into the church building but they have also raised significant funds both for the church and for nominated charities which have amounted to over half a million pounds over the twenty years. These funds have been used to pay for heating, lighting and sound systems, notice boards, paving and repairs to the tower and churchyard walls as well as the upgrade of the church rooms. The Friends Fund now also pays for all utility costs, maintenance, repairs and capital projects for St Mary's, the most significant of which this year has been the upgrading of the pathway between St Mary's and Kitson Hall.





lunches, not to mention everyday and longer term maintenance of the hall which is considerable.

Use of the hall has increased considerably since Christmas, mainly as a result of Clifford Studios now using the hall (small as well as large) for over 20 hours a week for dance and drama classes. Our main 'anchor' tenant is still The Ark Nursery who use the small hall every weekday morning during term time. We have recently provided them with a new storage shed and dramatically improved lighting in the small hall . The Barnes Summer Playscheme continue to use the entire hall (as they have done since the late 1980s) for a five week period over the Summer holidays. Other regular commercial users of the Hall includes children's gymnastic classes, a soccer skills academy, two music and movement classes for toddlers, puppy training and bicycle training lessons for youngsters. We also occasionally host wedding receptions and the Hall is very well used and popular with chidren's party bookings at the weekends. On the maintenance front, last year we obtained a surveyor's

report on the external fabric of the hall. Though no major problems were reported, the exterior clearly needs to be redecorated, which including minor repairs reported as needing doing is estimated to cost about £16,000. It has been decided to tackle this on a piecemeal basis, dealing with the frontage first. This will include the installation of a new prominent ST. MARY'S CHURCH KITSON HALL sign, in keeping with the 1920s style of the hall. Currently the words KITSON HALL do not appear anywhere, causing confusion to hirers and contractors.

On the financial front, Kitson Hall had a better year with fee income up slightly from £44,926 in 2014 to just over £48,332 in 2015. Overall expenses were down from £54,520 in 2014 to £30,643 in 2015 but that was partly because the party wall between the hall and 2, Kitson Road had to be rebuilt in 2014. One major item of expenditure envisaged for 2016 is a new replacement boiler as the existing one is unreliable and inefficient, with parts difficult to obtain. The estimated cost is of the order of £10,000 but there will be a significant saving in fuel costs, currently over £4,000 pa. Stage lights and a control box are soon to be installed at a cost of about £1,100 for the parts, with installation being carried out free by Barnes Community Players. Longer term, money needs to be set aside for a new cooker, resanding the floor and a major internal redecoration. I am optimistic about future prospects of the hall, both as a community resource, as an increasingly well used adjunct to the church (as a result of the improved link path) and a very popular venue for commercial hirers. However, I think it is important that it is maintained to a high standard and looks good, otherwise potential hirers will be put off.

Music at St Mary's

Music continues to thrive at St Mary's. Our choirs have grown in both number and quality again this year and it has been particularly pleasing to hear the choirs improve in confidence and ability.

The priority of our musical work remains the singing of the 10am Parish Eucharist. In addition to this we seek to enhance the principal Feasts of the liturgical year and again this year the choir has sung for the Christmas services including our best yet Carol Service, Epiphanytide (including much of the Ceremony of Carols by Britten), Ash Wednesday, Tenebrae, Palm Sunday Evensong and much more besides.




