## **Barnes Returns to Norfolk**

Wednesday: The 'Weekend' begins with coffee in the Orchard, Grantchester, in brilliant sunshine. The first quarter is at Trumpington and then another at Burwell, where the tower captain tries to frighten us about the trebles, and the organist competes with us. But we concentrate, hard. Then the first simultaneous attempts. At Reymerston the band is defeated by Norfolk. There's a puncture, too, but the others succeed at Yaxham. To East Dereham and we book into our hotel, where taps which turn 'the wrong way' provide entertainment.

Thursday: Speedy service at breakfast: the 'Full English' arrives when we have barely started the cereal. At Aylsham, the Organisers and the ringer who came by public transport arrive on time, but everyone else gets lost. We almost ring a quarter of Grandsire Caters. At Marsham there's a lockout by an Organiser who's at another tower, but handbells (found to be anti-clockwise) provide entertainment for our wait in the sun. While some ring a quarter at Saxthorpe, the rest go to Holt where there's bunting (for James Ingham's birthday?) and the Organisers wait in vain at the Methodist Church. We lose Erin but score a birthday tea, with cake and candles. Simultaneous quarters at Wighton and Little Walsingham, then for some a visit to the Shrine, and practice at Fakenham. Finally, a curry, and James celebrates once more, with a Passion Bowl, and a flaming sambuca brought in as we sing 'Happy Birthday'.

Friday: We must leave at 8, but someone is missing: she's waiting for her alarm (set for 6pm). Either the early start or yesterday's curry puts paid to simultaneous attempts at Saxlingham Nethergate and Woodton. After general ringing at Bungay there's lunch at Somerleyton, with a goat in the pub garden. One car tours the Rectory grounds in search of the church, and the quarter peal band are greeted by Lord Somerleyton. Bristol at Pakefield, with a sheep in the churchyard, then simultaneous quarters at Lowestoft and Carlton Colville. General ringing at Beccles, with its

fascinating peal boards, then the Dereham practice, the ninth tower of the day.

Saturday: Later breakfast and a long drive ahead, so all 20 of us appear together, to the hotel's dismay. To Gorleston and Yarmouth, then Woodbastwick where there's a 'Fate', for lunch at Woodforde,s brewery tap. It's a Jubilee Day Fate (We're Doin' Different) and during lunch the road is suddenly closed between us and the next tower, Ranworth. Happily the rumour that there are 300 steps is untrue. At All Saints, Norwich, the quarter's success owes much to Mike Wigney, who coached the Conductor from his hospital bed at Stoke Mandeville. The weather breaks. Dramatically. After St Peter Mancroft it's back to Dereham for the Dinner, with the Reverend Richard Ames-Lewis (Incumbent at East Dereham and former Rector at Barnes) and his wife Katharine as our guests. A mobile phone is handed round so that everyone can have a few words with Mike. We greatly miss him and Jill.

Sunday: After various combinations of service/ ringing/breakfast there are quarters at Dereham ('majestic') and at East Raynham, where we are privileged to be amongst the first visitors to ring on this fine new eight. More rain, so our picnic is relocated to the village hall. We return to the church where we are welcomed by Viscount Raynham and there's a second quarter, during which HM The Queen makes a private visit to the church and watches the ringing. Three more quarters follow and today's score is six out of six!

Monday: It couldn't last. Today's score is zero out of three, but we get home safely to marvel again at the enormous amount of work and careful planning by our Organisers, Eddie and Trisha. There have been 38 different towers, 30 quarter peal attempts (including 11 simultaneous pairs) and 22 ringers (arriving and leaving at different times) but it has all gone smoothly, thanks to them. Thanks too, to all the towers and ringers who made us so welcome. We've had a wonderful Weekend.
