## All Along Down Along Out Along Lea

Barnes ringers and friends returned to Devon for their summer tour after a gap of four years. Momentous things have happened during those years being locked in the bar in Abergavenny, or watched by HM the Queen as we rang Stedman Triples in Norfolk. Would the old stamping ground live up to expectations?

The advance party opened the score sheet on Wednesday with a quarter on the anti-clockwise six at East Knoyle before proceeding westwards, via further successes at Stockland, Honiton and Exminster, to Ashburton. The Dartmoor Lodge is not the most photogenic of hotels and best described as functional but it served as an adequate base for the week's activities.

Setting out across Dartmoor in the morning, we were quickly reminded that Devon miles are twice as long as anywhere else's. St Pancras, Widdecome-in-the-Moor, is a prominent landmark. [My mother tells a tale of cycling there at night, just after the war. Her relief when the tower finally loomed out of the darkness was somewhat tempered by the discovery that their lodgings in the vicarage were infested with large rats which carefully licked all the chocolate off a box of peppermint creams during the night.] But there were no sweet-toothed rodents in evidence this time and a good quarter of Grandsire was scored. Funny how

conceptions can take hold of one's mind - convinced Buckland-in-the-Moor was a six, I managed to take part in the raise and listen to ten minutes of Lincolnshire before noticing that there were actually eight bells.

A leisurely afternoon was spent at Buckfast Abbey, thanks to Giles, whose brother-in-law is one of the monks. Soon after lunch the tinkling of handbells could be heard emanating from the Physic Garden, while others marvelled at the displays of healing and harmful herbs and the Repository of Obscure Information informed all who cared to listen that purslane was highly esteemed as a remedy for blastings by lightning. Then the time came to ascend the tower and Philip, the hero of the hour, carried Mike up the spiral stairs on his back while others followed with bits of wheelchair. [This operation was repeated several times, albeit at a lesser height, and came to resemble those performances at military tattoos where a gun carriage is dismantled, carried over an obstacle and reassembled with great speed and precision.] Whilst the twelve were enjoyable to ring, the highlight was surely seeing the great bourdon bell Hosanna swinging in slow motion and hearing the rich harmonics of its majestic voice reverberating around the tower

Quarters at Buckfastleigh and Dartington were lost, spoiling the hitherto unblemished record but Yorkshire at Ashburton put us back on course. The menu at the Exeter Inn proved to be a little unimaginative (item n: three sausages and chips, item n+1: four sausages and chips). Friday was spent in and around Torquay, including Cockington, a popular choice for local weddings. The obligatory cream tea was taken in one of those pretentiously unpretentious tea rooms with an art gallery attached.. If such places are asking to have their tone lowered, Jim was happy to oblige by asking for a tub of water to bathe his throbbing feet.

Saturday's ringing centred on Newton Abbot and the Teign valley. After an excellent buffet lunch, Plain and Little was abandoned at Highiweek and Bob Major rung both inside and outside the tower. James Ingham chalked up a personal milestone at Kingsteignton. The Dinner was perhaps subdued compared with previous years (no jilted brides flouncing around to liven the place up) but the food was good and plentiful. Eddle and Trisha were heartily thanked for their superborganisation, it being noted that Eddle's mobile never stopped ringing, even during quarter peals.

After a quarter of St Clements's College Bob Minor on the excellent bells at Dunsford, Sunday's tea venue was at the Canonteign Falls, where we found St Clements's cake on the menu; the successful band tucked in! Sadly there was not time to view the waterfall but other entertainment was forthcoming, for scarcely had we sat down when a fat duck waddled up to our table. It soon transpired that the creature was inordinately fond of scones and probably spent most of the café's opening hours indulging its addiction. A waitress shooed it out, only for the duck to re-enter by the other door the moment her back was turned, to continue its life's work of voluntary fois gras production.

A little drama occurred at Trusham where the fourth failed to set, burning Lucy's hands. Fortunately the kind lady in the neighbouring cottage was able to administer first aid. Subsequent inspection revealed that the slider had been removed. Although the tower was covered in scaffolding, we had been assured that it was safe to ring and that indeed the local band had rung for service that morning. We can only assume that they were "proper" Devon ringers (i.e. up, call changes and straight down).

By Monday numbers had dwindled more than anticipated and, although locals were pressed into service at Ilsington and Seavington, the final tower had to be cancelled. Nevertheless, it was by any standards a successful venture: 31 towers, 21 quarters out of 27 attempts, plus two in hand, plenty of beer and enough clotted cream to keep the old cholesterol happy for weeks.
