WELCOME

Sometimes we might wonder what is the purpose of Advent in the rush towards Christmas. This year many of us feel a need for the comfort and joy of Christmas more than ever and there is great temptation to bypass the season altogether. At the same time, the Advent themes of watching and waiting for deliverance also seem more resonant, as we await with expectation some kind of freedom from the restrictions currently imposed upon us because of the pandemic. This longing for restoration of our lives, can be spiritually useful as a reflection of the Christian longing for salvation in Christ which is fulfilment of all our hopes.

With these thoughts in mind, our readings this evenings are themed around the virtue of hope. the first reading from the Lamentations attributed to Jeremiah is believed to have been written in the wake of the Babylonian exile. At a time when all hope seemed to have disappeared, the prophet reaffirms his faith in God saying 'I will hope in him'. The second reading is Psalm 130 which is sometimes given the title 'Waiting for Divine Redemption' and speaks of waiting for the deliverance of God. The third reading from the first letter of Saint Peter is an emotional outburst of praise to the God who has given us a 'living hope' in Jesus Christ that sustains us in our current trials and looks forward to its final fulfilment in the future. This completion is found in the fourth and final reading from the book of Revelation and Saint John's vision of glory of heaven. In its midst is a tree whose 'leaves are for the healing of the nations'. It is for this healing that our world longs for more than ever in our current sufferings.

Although we cannot meet together as usual for our Advent Carol service, it is particularly important as Christians in Barnes that we should express our essential unity in faith by still coming together to pray. We cannot replicate the usual service online, but we can still watch and wait in prayer, and listen and reflect on Holy Scripture together. It is our hope that in this short and meditative service you may begin the season of Advent and receive the blessings it has to give. As we pray together but each in our own individual homes, let us remember that the Lord Jesus came to us in the intimacy of a human family who dwelt in Nazareth. Let us also remember that if our hearts are prepared to receive him, he will also come to dwell in our hearts and homes when Christmas comes.

When he comes may the Lord Jesus find us watching and waiting. Amen.



A few notes for the service:

- The host will put everyone on mute as they arrive.
- It is recommended that you have your screen on 'speaker view' for the service.
- If it is safe to do so, you are encouraged to light a candle at home in a place that is visible.

PREPARATION and INTRODUCTION

FIRST READING Lamentations 3.19-24, 31-33

A reading from the book of Lamentations.

The thought of my affliction and my homelessness is wormwood and gall!

My soul continually thinks of it and is bowed down within me.

But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope:

The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

'The Lord is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.'

For the Lord will not reject for ever.

Although he causes grief, he will have compassion according to the abundance of his steadfast love;

for he does not willingly afflict or grieve anyone.

This is the word of the Lord.

But there is forgiveness with you, so that you may be revered.

I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I hope; my soul waits for the Lord more than those who watch for the morning, more than those who watch for the morning.

For with the Lord there is steadfast love, and with him is great power to redeem.

It is he who will redeem Israel from all its iniquities.

THIRD READING 1 Peter 1.3-9

A reading from the first letter of Saint Peter.

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. Although you have not seen him, you

love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

This is the word of the Lord.

FOURTH READING

Revelation 22.1-7

A reading from the book of Revelation.

Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations. Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign for ever and ever.

And he said to me, 'These words are trustworthy and true, for the Lord, the God of the spirits of the prophets, has sent his angel to show his servants what must soon take place.' 'See, I am coming soon! Blessed is the one who keeps the words of the prophecy of this book.'
